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From the Principal's Desk



Communication Policy:

I want to take this opportunity to raise an issue that we at the high school encounter on a daily basis: cell phone use and text messaging. Though we recognize that we live in the age of instant access to communication and information, we also strive to provide an academic setting that is as free from distractions as is feasible. That's a tall order and that is also why we enlist the support of parents and guardians to assist us in establishing a focused school environment. First, we have a straightforward policy that outlines the use of cell phones and other technology devices. With respect to cell phones, BlackBerries, and other electronic communication tools, we understand that students have them but we expect that they remain off during the school day. We also require students to keep them out of sight and in a secure location (locked in their lockers preferably). Sometimes students report that they must contact their parents during or throughout the day. We will always allow this if they let us know in advance and/or we will be glad to relay a parent message to a student. Overall, cell phone use is no bigger an issue here than it is anywhere else in our society; however, our task is significant. As our Mission Statement notes, we are here to help each student "achieve high intellectual and ethical standards" and "discover and develop" their unique strengths and interests. As such, any steps we as a school community can take to further reduce the distractions of our outside world from 7:40-2:20 would be greatly appreciated on behalf of the faculty at Nashoba. A Note from the Nurses:



"Winter Weather Warning Signs"

Know when to come in from the cold! Here's what you need to know to protect yourself from frostbite and hypothermia.

<u>Frostbite</u>- occurs when skin tissue freezes. In early stages, frostbite can be reversible, but it can quickly turn serious.

Symptoms include: numbness, skin discoloration (gray, white, or yellow), waxy feeling skin

<u>Hypothermia</u>- a life-threatening condition, results when the core body temperature drops below 95 degrees.

Watch for these warning signs: severe shivering, confusion, dizziness, exhaustion

If you experience any symptoms of hypothermia or frostbite, don't wait. Get out of the cold into a warm, dry place immediately and seek medical attention.

Postural Screenings

The Nashoba Regional High School will be conducting the annual Postural Screening starting the week of **February 9-13**, 2009.

Appropriate privacy is always provided during screening. To make it easier for screeners and students, please have your child wear shorts and tank tops for girls.

The purpose of this screening is to find the early signs of possible spinal problems in students in **grade 9**. It is not a diagnostic service but a *screening* to identify young peo-

ple who require further medical evaluation. Your child can be excluded from this screening with a note from the parent. If your child has any unusual findings, you will be contacted and asked to take the child to a physician as a precaution.

Medical note: the incidence of Pertussis, also known as "whooping cough" is on the rise. Pertussis is a highly contagious, infectious disease. Early symptoms mimic an upper respiratory infection: low grade fever, a runny nose and a cough that progressively becomes worse and may last up to 10 weeks. Adolescents often do not exhibit the classic "whoop" as infants do, making diagnosis more difficult. Severe coughing episodes can lead to vomiting, a hernia or even a broken rib. Please seek medical evaluation if you are experiencing these symptoms.

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NRHS Math Team Excels

The Nashoba Math Team has had a busy first half of the year. The team attended the first annual Harvard/MIT fall math tournament in November—a competition for schools within 75 miles of Cambridge. The Nashoba team of five sophomores and one senior finished a strong 26 out of 60 teams that included private academies and public high school teams with all upper classmen. For the first time, Nashoba will be sending three teams to the Spring Harvard/MIT Math Tournament on February 21st. The meet will see 700 students from all over the U.S. and abroad for a day of individual and team problem solving competition.

Nashoba is also having a great competition year in the Worcester County Math League (WOCOMAL) at both the Freshman and Varsity level again this year. The freshman team is in a hotly contested race trying to repeat as the Worcester County Math League (WOCOMAL) Freshmen Champions. The team is currently in $2^{\rm nd}$ place.

On the Varsity side, the team has moved up to 4^{th} place in a very competitive Class A division. Last year Nashoba finished in 5^{th} place. We have five students in the top 40 of the over 500 students involved in the WOCOMAL Varsity league.

The Math team will also sponsor the American Mathematics Contest 10/12 on February 10^{th} and February 25^{th} . The 75 minute tests help our students compare their problem solving capabilities to students across the world. The test also serves as the initial gateway test that culminates in students competing in the U.S. Mathematics Olympiad.

Our thanks to the NRHS Endowment Fund for their recent grant that makes these increased math team activities possible. Thanks this year also goes to the two assistant math team coaches: Mrs. Mason and Mrs. Clark.

If you know a student who is passionate about math and likes to solve interesting problems we always welcome new participants. Have your student speak with the Math Coach, Ms. Redford, or come to a meeting. We have math team meetings every Monday afternoon that school is in session in room 103 from 2:30-3:30.
