For 14 NRHS Students, It's All About Business

It was a proud moment for Nashoba Regional High School teacher Mary Marotta when 11 of the school's students placed at a recent business competition recently held in Chelmsford.



It was only the second year NRHS students had competed at the event and the teams they were facing had more members and more experience, said Marotta, the head of the school's business and technology department.

"They said we weren't going to get any (awards) because we didn't have as many students as some of the other schools there," Marotta said. "Then we kept getting called up."

Fourteen of the school's business students have qualified to compete at the state competition, March 13-15 at the Copley Plaza Hotel in Boston. The event is part of a national competition run by the Distributive Education Clubs of America, an organization of high schools and colleges focused on business education. The students, who compete either on their own or with a partner, are judged on how well they do on both a 100 question written test and

a role-playing scenario in front of a group of judges, something sophomore Mike Cummings described as "nerve-wracking." "They take you into a small side room to study for 10 minutes, and then you're brought in to where the judges are," Cummings said.

The judges are successful business people who judge the students on how well they present a given product, whether it is advertising that product or management, according to Paula Fontaine, a business teacher at the school and the team's first-time coach. "It is a great program, and it teaches these kids so much," Fontaine said.

Students are allowed to choose what field of business they want to be tested on, whether it's marketing for a fast food company to financial analysis, Fontaine said. "There are hundreds of students from around the state who attend the competition, which adds to the event's excitement," Senior Cait MacBrien said. "It's intense," she said. "There are a lot of people that go to this."

Students who place at the state competition move on to the nationals in Atlanta, where they can win a college scholarship, said MacBrien, who plans on entering the business field one day.

Fontaine's team is currently focused on raising money to get to the state competition. It costs \$195 per student to compete, plus the added costs of renting rooms and transportation, Fontaine said. Raising money to compete allows students the chance to practice what they learn, Fontaine added. The student's have held bake sales and sold flowers and balloons on Valentine's Day to raise money. They also help run a school store, Marotta said.

"What it really does is help them understand how to run a business," Marotta said about the store.

The competition is not all work for the students, who range from freshmen taking their first business course to seniors preparing for college. Each night different activities, such as a dance or access to the hotel's swimming pool, are set up for the business people in training.

Marotta said that even though this is only the second year the school has participated in the DECA competitions, she thinks the students have what it takes to win at the state competition. "We'll see," Marotta said. "We'll see."

Nashoba Robotics

On January 5th, the 2008 FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) Robotics kickoff event was held in Manchester, NH. It marked the beginning of the 2008 "build season" for all teams worldwide



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that will be participating in this year's competition. Teams were presented with this year's challenge and received a kit of parts to be used to build the robot. The 2008 game is called "FIRST Overdrive". The object of the game is to score points by making laps around a track with your robot while moving "trackballs" over and/or under an overpass. This is no small task since the trackballs are 40 inches in diameter and weigh 7 pounds!

For six weeks after the kickoff event, members of the Nashoba Robotics team worked intensely to build the robot, while receiving guidance from Mr. Fordiani and our many other technical mentors. Many hours were spent in the CAD room, machine shop and Mr. Fordiani's room designing, machining parts, and building the robot to meet the challenge. The robot was shipped on February 19th to await the Boston Regional Competition.

The Nashoba Robotics team will compete with more than 1000 high school students on 50 other teams at the Boston Regional Competition **on Friday and Saturday, March 28th and 29th** at Boston University's Agganis Arena. Event finals begin at 12:45 on Saturday with a **special appearance by Blue Man Group!!!**

Come support the team and demonstrate your Nashoba pride! The arena will be filled with rock music and cheering fans while the teams compete in intense matches. The fun, dynamic, competition runs from 9 am-5 pm each day, but you can go for any length of time. Admission is free! Concessions are available. From the Nurse's Office

Stopping Germs at Home, Work and School

*** Colds, other flu-like viruses, Strep, and stomach viruses have made an appearance this school year. **Please remind your child to wash their hands before eating, after coughing or sneezing.**

We would like to remind you of ways to protect yourself and family from ever present viruses.

How Germs Spread

The main way that illnesses like colds and flu are spread is from person to person in respiratory droplets of coughs and sneezes. This is called "droplet spread" and can easily reach 10 feet!

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This can happen when droplets from a cough or sneeze of an infected person move through the air and are deposited on the mouth or nose of people nearby. Sometimes germs also can be spread when a person touches respiratory droplets from another person on a surface like a desk and then touches his or her own eyes, mouth or nose before washing their hands. We know that some viruses and bacteria can live 2 hours or longer on surfaces like cafeteria tables, doorknobs, and desks.

How to **Stop** the Spread of Germs

In a nutshell: take care to

- Cover your mouth and nose
- Clean your hands often
- Remind your children to practice healthy habits, too

Cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing

Cough or sneeze into a tissue and then throw it away and wash your hands. No tissue? Cough or sneeze into the crook of your elbow.



Alcohol-Based Hand Wipes and Gel Sanitizers Work Too

When soap and water are not available, alcohol-based disposable hand wipes or gel sanitizers may be used. You can find them in most supermarkets and drugstores. If using gel, rub your hands until the gel is dry. The gel doesn't need water to work; the alcohol in it kills the germs on your hands.

**Stay home when you are sick and check with a health care provider when needed

When you are sick or have flu symptoms, stay home, get plenty of rest, and check with a health care provider as needed. **Whenever a student is out sick, an excuse note is required within 48 hours of returning to school. If a student is out sick for 5 consecutive days, a **doctor's** note is required. Remember: Keeping your distance from others may protect them from getting sick. Common symptoms of the flu include:

- fever (usually high)
- headache
- extreme tiredness
- cough
- sore throat
- runny or stuffy nose
- muscle aches, and
- nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea, (much more common among children than adults).

Viral Gastroenteritis

What is viral gastroenteritis?

Gastroenteritis means inflammation of the stomach and small and large intestines. Viral gastroenteritis is an infection caused by a variety of viruses that results in vomiting or diarrhea. It is often called the "stomach flu," although it is not caused by the influenza viruses.

What are the symptoms of viral gastroenteritis?

The main symptoms of viral gastroenteritis are watery diarrhea and vomiting. The affected person may also have headache, fever, and abdominal cramps ("stomach ache"). In general, the symptoms begin 1 to 2 days following infection with a virus that causes gastroenteritis and may last for 1 to 10 days, depending on which virus causes the illness.

Is viral gastroenteritis a serious illness?

For most people, it is not. People who get viral gastroenteritis almost always recover completely without any long-term problems.

**Is the illness contagious? How are these viruses spread?

**Yes, viral gastroenteritis is contagious. The viruses that cause gastroenteritis are spread through close contact with infected persons (for example, by sharing food, water, or eating utensils). Individuals may also become infected by eating or drinking contaminated foods or beverages.

Where and when does viral gastroenteritis occur?

Viral gastroenteritis affects people in all parts of the world. Each virus has its own seasonal activity. For example, in the United States, rotavirus and astrovirus infections occur during the cooler months of the year (*October to April*), whereas adenovirus infections occur throughout the year. Viral gastroenteritis outbreaks can occur in institutional settings, such as schools, child care facilities, and nursing homes, and can occur in other group settings, such as banquet halls, cruise ships, dormitories, and campgrounds.

Who gets viral gastroenteritis?

Anyone can get it. Viral gastroenteritis occurs in people of all ages and backgrounds. However, some viruses tend to cause diarrhea disease primarily among people in specific age groups. Rotavirus infection is the most common cause of diarrhea in infants and young children under 5 years old. Adenoviruses and astroviruses cause diarrhea mostly in young children, but older children and adults can also be affected. Norwalk and Noroviruses are more likely to cause diarrhea in older children and adults.

NASHOBA Regional School District is embarking on an exciting capital campaign to make our high school a premiere destination for all community competitions in the area. Over the next eighteen months we are seeking your involvement in the renovation of our athletic complex at NASH-OBA Regional High School located at 12 Green Road in Bolton, Massachusetts. This renovation will include the installation of a turf playing field large enough for all varsity level playing events, a retrofit of the track for all varsity level track and field events and lighting/sound system upgrades that will allow for outdoor fine arts events. The estimate for this project is \$1.4 million dollars.

Our goal is to raise \$1.4 million dollars with \$500,000 raised by April 1, 2008. The remaining cost of the project will be bonded by the Regional School District and paid for annually through appropriations from the operations budget, annual revenue from rental of the facility, and annual fund raising from this drive.
